REPORT FROM THE CHAIRPERSON

During the financial year 2008-2009 the Board of Directors has focused its work on creating a contemporary, compliant governance framework to guide and support the future and growth of the Independent Living Centre NSW.

The drafting of a new constitution was the major piece of work. We were grateful for pro bono assistance from Clayton Utz, and in particular, Mr Nicholas Santucci, in the preparation of this foundation document.

In addition to the constitution, the Board has developed and approved a set of policies guiding its governance function. These policies outline the primary governance role and responsibilities of the Board and define the Board's relationship with the Chief Executive Officer.

The development of the strategic plan "Towards Tomorrow 2009-2012" was completed. The plan was developed following extensive discussion with Board, staff members and stakeholders and approved for implementation on July 1st 2009. It provides new vision and purpose statements that reaffirm the organizations commitment to our core business of providing information and advice on Assistive Technologies and the Built Environment to anyone who needs it.

The four strategic goals within the plan are:

- To grow our range of services to reach more people in more ways.
- To advise on systemic changes that lead to a wider use of assistive technology and a responsive, accessible built environment.
- To increase the brand awareness, public perception and knowledge of the ILC NSW.
- To develop viable, alternative sources of revenue to support our operations.

Operationally, the Independent Living Centre NSW is already working towards it aim to increase its scope and reach, with the development of a new web based model of service delivery. We look forward to the future development of this model of support that should increase the equity of access to up-to-date information for all people in NSW, but especially for those who are unable to attend the display at the ILC.

During the year there were a number of changes in directors. Margaret Vickers, retiring Chairperson, left the Board following her appointment as a full professor with the University of Western Sydney. I would like to thank Margaret for her energy and commitment and for initiating the processes that have lead to the development of our new strategic plan.

Karyn Scanlan, who served as Company Secretary also left us this year and I would like to thank her for her work as a Board member, always difficult from a distance. We welcomed Ms Ann-Mason Furmage and Ms Beth Fulton both of whom bring extensive experience that add value to the organization.

The Board is working well, The Independent Living Centre NSW is flourishing and, with your support we look forward to an even better year next year.

REPORT FROM THE CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER

I am pleased to present this report on the operational activities of the Independent Living Centre NSW for the year 2008-2009.

The focus of the year was consolidation of the organisational framework, a modern contemporary framework to carry the ILC NSW through the next three years of its development.

In addition to the constitution and board policies a new Strategic Plan, "Towards Tomorrow 2009-2012" was developed following extensive consultation and an examination of the environment in which we work.

We are now working towards fulfilling our vision and purpose though our four strategic goals. The plan emphasizes our core business and provides a focus for continued growth and development within the vision and purpose. For the first time the ILC NSW has an agreed set of values, the behavioural characteristics that underpin all of our work.

We remain committed to our relationship within the network of the Independent Living Centres of Australia (ILCA). The ILCA is now attracting support from the Australian government, and as a result of this, the network is investigating governance models that will enable the ILCA to function as a national entity, at the same time protecting the needs of each member state.

This year our major piece of work has been the re-development of our website, known as the Rural Assistive Technology Support Project. This project presented us with interesting challenges. As announced in last year's annual report, the Department of Ageing Disability and Homecare funded the project that had as its outcome the increase in information on Assistive Technologies available to rural allied health professionals. I am pleased to report that the new website will be launched by The Hon. Paul Lynch, Minister for Disability Services and Minister for Ageing in November.

The work involved has been immense, and we are all grateful for the collaborative approach of our website developers, Dr Daniel Woo, Mr Simon Pan and Mr James Salter from the Human Computer Interaction Laboratory, Faculty of Engineering, University of NSW.

We will now have a modern, user-centred website, with the addition of web media and facetted searching of the product database, now known as "@t Magic". Allied Health professionals will have access to their individual, private user area with a clipboard function, together with the capacity to compare items on the computer screen and a function to assist in the development of their AT prescriptions.

The development of web media is a new tool for information dissemination for the ILC NSW. We will be able to record video, audio and still presentations and send out via the website. Web media currently consists of training modules, therapeutic discussions, suppliers visits and demonstrations and our regular updates on latest products. Congratulations to Katrina Smith for taking on the Web media development role, learning the skills required and for creating the current library of web media.

Linked to the website project, we embarked upon an additional project designed to improve the quality and quantity of data held within the database and to identify a new process for managing the product data. This project further identified that the database could not be easily translated to the new website and that in its current form, it would not be possible to have an improved search function available on the website. Thus the database project changed focus to include a readjustment to the way in which we classify and store product data.

Following some testing of ideas, we were able to request some new functionality for the national database that would enable the new facetted search function interface to work.

This was a large and concentrated body of work and I would like to thank:

- The Board of Directors for having the foresight to allocate additional funds to the initial database management project;
- Rolene Nehama, Team Leader Client Services for her absolute, single minded focus and commitment in driving this body of work;
- Dr Daniel Woo and his team for their knowledge, understanding and application;
- Jenny Foreman for supporting and training staff;
- Goretti Kee for assistance in all matters IT related to this project;
- Andy Muir, ILCA Database designer and
- the staff of the ILC NSW for their solid commitment to this project.

We now have a body of staff who are able to operate and maintain the database to the high quality that our clients deserve, and a database with improved web based search functionality.

In addition, we were joined by four very talented volunteers. Without their skills and attention to detail, the intense database work would not have been done in a smooth and timely manner. My heartfelt thanks to Robyn Gillard, Emma Nehama, Sarah Clemson and Nicole Chaitow, our volunteers, for their commitment to the work of the ILC NSW.

ILC Access

ILC Access continues to grow, in spite of the Global Financial Crisis, under the leadership of Sue Slattery. This year we were successful in gaining significant contracts, auditing schools in South East Queensland and Western Sydney, and DADHC operated rural based Community Participation sites. We also continued our work with the Sydney Olympic Authority.

Congratulations to Sue Slattery on becoming a fully accredited Access Consultant.

The "You're Welcome" project has been completed and we are seeking funding to continue this important project. We are fortunate to have the strong support of COTA in promoting the need for the expansion of "You're Welcome" into all areas of NSW. Many thanks to John Evernden for his passion on the need for accessible and age friendly communities.

Karen Vogel from Client Services has joined the Access team, adding increased capacity to this service.

ILC Training

With Anne Wallace and Katrina Smith joining Sue Slattery, we were able to expand our training. As well as our two VETAB accredited courses, which continue to be popular, we developed additional AT specific courses to those already available. These included: Dementia Technology, Staying Connected, Living Easier Energy Conservation, Vehicle Modifications, Mobility Aids and we significantly updated Continence Management.

Journal

"Independent Living", now in its 25th year has had a successful year. The implementation of journal themes has been a success, but more importantly we were invited to register the journal with EBSCO. As a result by December 2009 the content of the journal can be found by searching the large international allied health and rehabilitation databases. This will assist in strengthening the impact of the journal, not only nationally, but internationally.

The only negative to the year was the impact the Global Financial Crisis, meaning that several advertisers decided to discontinue their advertisements. We are slowly building back to a sustainable base of advertisers and are, as ever, grateful for their support of our work.

Enable NSW

I am very pleased that we have been able to develop a relationship with Enable NSW. We are now training new customer service staff on "An Introduction to Assistive Technology", and Robyn Chapman has been invited to participate in staff recruitment processes.

The ILC NSW is looking forward to the further development of this important relationship.

New staff

During the financial year we welcomed Anthony Sammut, as previously reported, Allie Chen, Occupational Therapist employed to enable Katrina Smith's secondment to the Rural Assistive Technology Support project, and previous staff Julie Wakeman and Kristie Conners who joined us in times of staffing need.

In the media

Our Commitment to "Choice" continues, and once again ILC NSW staff conducted assessments of

whitegoods for 6 issues of Choice Magazine. Congratulations go to Rolene Nehama and Karin Vogel for undertaking this work.

We provided an article on Preventing Falls for Town and Country Magazine, with a follow up in the Yass Times. Congratulations Sue Slattery and Anne Wallace.

Research

Congratulations to Anne Wallace who completed the assessments of the research subject, as part of the pre-pilot of our research partnership" with the University of Western Sydney. The research, that examines the "Cost-effectiveness analyses of assistive technology based on the International Classification of Functioning, Disability and Health" is lead by Dr Ingrid Schraner. We are currently awaiting a linkage grant funding decision by the Australian Research Council.

Home Modifications Information Clearing House

The ILC NSW has finalised its relationship with the Home Modifications Information Clearing House, through the signing of an MOU. The two services are considered to be linked by DADHC.

Royal Rehabilitation Centre, Sydney

An interesting expansion of our role and model of service delivery was the "Standing Wheelchair Demonstration" that we were able to organise for Royal Rehabilitation Centre (RRC) Sydney. RRC approached the ILC NSW to ask for information on standing wheelchairs and their availability.

It was decided that the most effective means for RRC to examine these items would be for the ILC NSW to coordinate a day with all the available wheelchairs available for demonstration. This we were able to do: every chair available in Australia plus one prototype were brought to the ILC NSW and reviewed by staff prior to the presentation to RRC senior management.

Our thanks to the suppliers who lent their chairs for the demonstration.

As ever we are grateful for the support of Mark Hammett of Kensington Computer Support, Andy Muir of Muir Software, Paul Coster from Column Inch Communications and Joan Pack for their ongoing support the Independent Living Centre NSW and its important work.

The ILC NSW is, as ever, thankful for the support provided by the NSW Department of Ageing, Disability and Home Care for their funding support, through both the Home And Community Care program and the new National Disability Agreement program (previously the CSTDA).

We would also like to thank DADHC for finding the funds to replace our ageing server, a much needed improvement to our service delivery.

REPORT FROM THE TREASURER

The ILC NSW ended the 2008-09 financial year with a surplus of \$54,974 compared with a surplus of \$40,630 in the previous financial year. Total liabilities decreased from \$433,779 to \$268,172 and Total Equity increased to \$322,928 from \$268,177.

Income

Total income increased in 2008-09 to \$1,280,271 or 14% from \$1,121,480.

Other main sources of income included DADHC HACC Program \$148,201, DADHC Disability Services Program \$648,404, DoCS Area Assistance Scheme \$51,276, ILC Access \$100,706, Education & Training Services \$48,088, and Advertising, Subscriptions and Sales from the ILC Journal \$51,786.

Expenditure

Total expenditure increased to \$1,225,297 by \$144,447 or 13%. This was mainly due to the fully funded Rural Support and Website development expenses of \$173,432. This is split as follows: University of NSW \$122,400, ILC Wages \$42,000, Assets \$5,578 and Others \$3,454. This leaves \$76,568 to be expended by September 2009.

Risks

The board, during 2008, approved a strategic and aggressive management policy change with regard to the collection of outstanding debtors where the past due items will be more effectively monitored and reported.

Debtors with overdue amounts are now pursued in a methodical manner with difficult debts being referred to a retained collection agency with very good results. Debts to the value of \$5,945 were written off during 2008-09.

Conclusion

The excellent work of the CEO, supported by the oversight of the Board, have positioned the ILC NSW to be able to consolidate its current business and build a sound base from which is extending its operations.

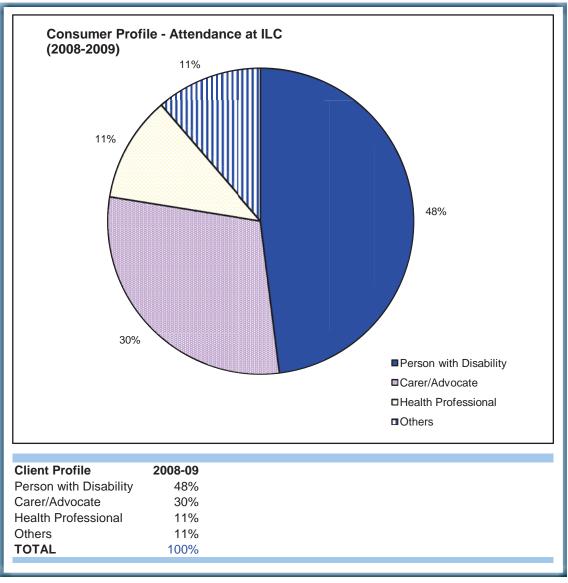

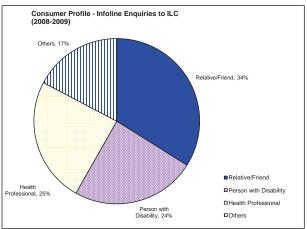

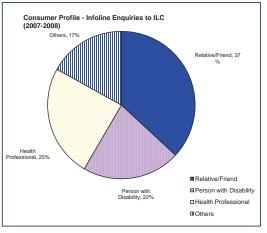

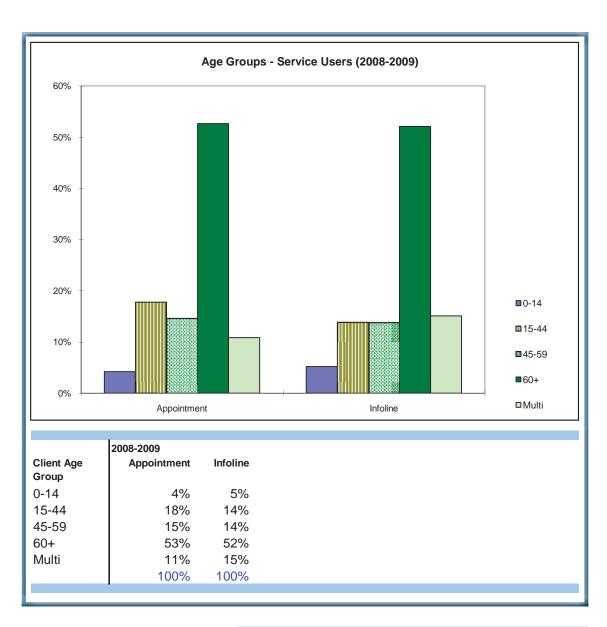
PIE CHART SHOWING BREAKDOWN OF CLIENTS ATTENDING ILC NSW DURING 2008-09



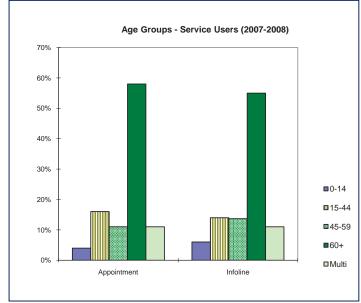
